Keeping us connected during the Coronavirus Pandemic

Fr. Scott's Sharing Spot

Dear Parish Family....

I'm sure that there are times that Pope Francis wishes he weren't the pope, but were instead the pastor of a parish (or maybe two) like I am. I'm sure there are times when he would gladly trade the honor and glamor of his duties for the connection he'd get with people if he got to work as a parish priest, meeting with people to discuss their life challenges, marrying those in love, celebrating the lives those who have died, and writing a regular *Sharing Spot* for a parish bulletin or newsletter as I am now.

Perhaps that's why he actually did that last week! The Pope wrote an article to American Catholics – published in the *New York Times* on Thanksgiving Day – that was essentially a Sharing Spot. It was a very tender and fatherly reflection on what we as individuals are going through with Coronavirus and about the rare and valuable spiritual opportunities we have available to us because of this time of struggle.

In case you didn't get to read it, I thought I'd share a couple of excerpts. He began by reflecting on his critical illness when he was young, which places him in the high-risk group for COVID-19.

"When I got really sick at the age of 21, I had my first experience of limit, of pain and loneliness. It changed the way I saw life. For months, I didn't know who I was or whether I would live or die. The doctors had no idea whether I'd make it either. I remember hugging my mother and saying, "Just tell me if I'm going to die." I was in the second year of training for the priesthood in the diocesan seminary of Buenos Aires.

I remember the date: Aug. 13, 1957. I got taken to a hospital by a prefect who realized mine was not the kind of flu you treat with aspirin. Straightaway they took a liter and a half of water out of my lungs, and I remained there fighting for my life. The following November they operated to take out the upper right lobe of one of the lungs. I have some sense of how people with COVID-19 feel as they struggle to breathe on a ventilator.

I remember especially two nurses from this time. One was the senior ward matron, a Dominican sister who had been a teacher in Athens before being sent to Buenos Aires. I learned later that following the first examination by the doctor, after he left she told the nurses to double the dose of medication he had prescribed — basically penicillin and streptomycin — because she knew from experience I was dying. Sister Cornelia Caraglio saved my life. Because of her regular contact with sick people, she understood better than the doctor what they needed, and she had the courage to act on her knowledge. Another nurse, Micaela, did the same when I was in intense pain, secretly prescribing me extra doses of painkillers outside my due times. Cornelia and Micaela are in heaven now, but I'll always owe them so much. They fought for me to the end, until my eventual

recovery. They taught me what it is to use science but also to know when to go beyond it to meet particular needs. And the serious illness I lived through taught me to depend on the goodness and wisdom of others.

This theme of helping others has stayed with me these past months. In lockdown I've often gone in prayer to those who sought all means to save the lives of others. So many of the nurses, doctors and caregivers paid that price of love, together with priests, and religious and ordinary people whose vocations were service. We return their love by grieving for them and honoring them."

One of the gifts Pope Francis gives us by going back into his memory and telling these stories about how others helped him survive this illness is that it enables us to try to identify the "Sr. Cornelias" and "Michaelas" that are in our life <u>today</u>. Rather than just looking back to those people who helped us in the past, we can realize that this crisis is a blessed time that we can use creatively, to make ourselves and our community better. The Holy Father goes on:

"This is a moment to dream big, to rethink our priorities — what we value, what we want, what we seek — and to commit to act in our daily life on what we have dreamed of. God asks us to dare to create something new. We cannot return to the false securities of the political and economic systems we had before the crisis... We need to slow down, take stock and design better ways of living together on this earth.

The pandemic has exposed the paradox that while we are more connected, we are also more divided... It is hard to build a culture of encounter, in which we meet as people with a shared dignity, within a throwaway culture that regards the well-being of the elderly, the unemployed, the disabled and the unborn as peripheral to our own well-being."

"...If we are to come out of this crisis less selfish than when we went in, we have to let ourselves be touched by others' pain...

To come out of this crisis better, we have to recover the knowledge that as a people we have a shared destination. The pandemic has reminded us that no one is saved alone. What ties us to one another is what we commonly call solidarity. Solidarity is more than acts of generosity, important as they are; it is the call to embrace the reality that we are bound by bonds of reciprocity.

On this solid foundation we can build a better, different, human future."

If we let ourselves get in touch with the pain and fear that we are facing in these times... and expand that out to see that others are hurting with worries and hurts like ours (and some worse than ours) we can become better, more loving, more connected, less selfish people.

If the bitter political experience we've been experiencing has taught us anything, it's that we can't expect to be strong and united by focusing on our divisions. Our shared human experience is stronger and more real than anything that could divide us. We're all children of the same God and, as the Pope said so beautifully, "As a people, we have a shared destination."




