Fr. Scott's Sharing Spot

Dear Parish Family....

Three emotions demand our attention when we feel them: fear, sorrow and anger. And for most of us, how we deal with them is tricky business.

When they are healthy, fear, sorrow and anger are meant to serve as signals to us.

Healthy fear signals to us that we're in the presence of danger.

Healthy sorrow signals to us that we've been injured.

Healthy anger signals to us that we're in the presence of injustice.

Jesus got angry at the moneychangers in the Temple. He wept at the death of his friend, Lazarus. He sweat blood the night before his crucifixion. Jesus knew fear, sorrow and anger.

But for all humans, those emotions sometimes go haywire and get unhealthy.

When there is no urgent danger, but we still feel fear, we are in **anxiety**.

When there is no new injury, but we still feel sorrow, we are in **depression**.

When there is no serious injustice, but we still feel anger, we are in rage.

Knowing this provides a great opportunity for growth and real transformation.

Can you recognize when this dynamic has happened in your own life? Can you look back to a time when your heart was racing and your mind darting all over, as if you were in the middle of a life-threatening situation, but since there was none, you were actually dealing with anxiety?

Can you recognize the times when you have been sad for no clear reason, perhaps because of a hurt that happened long ago, and see that your sorrow had turned into depression? (Note: Not Clinical Depression, that's got a different cause, but this is an *episode* of situational depression.)

Have you ever gotten so mad about something you feel should not have happened that you took it out on coworkers, family members, cashiers (and maybe other drivers)? That's when your anger crossed into rage.

"Woe to you, scribes and pharisees! You whitewashed tombs" – Jesus Christ (Matthew 23:27-28)

Jesus got angry. And that's because (in the case of this quoted encounter) he was in the presence of the unjust burdens they placed upon sincere religious people in order to maintain their status and power. His anger was a signal to him (and to his followers) that he was in the presence of injustice. In fact, if he had seen how their greed and hunger for power hurt good and innocent people and he *didn't* feel anger, that would have been terrible. We *ought* to feel

anger when we're in the presence of injustice. St. Thomas Aquinas said that not being angry when we *ought to be* is a sin. (ST II,II.158)

So it is good that Jesus felt that anger, but it's also good that he allowed that anger to be processed and expressed to the **right people**, in the **right degree**, for a **reasonable amount of time**. He showed us how healthy anger looks. It's anger... there's no mistaking it. But it's pointed in the right direction, with the right amount of force. And when it's over, it's over.

We don't always get angry in the way that Jesus did. Have you ever lost your temper and, in that moment, forgotten about everything except for the anger you were feeling? Have you ever said things in anger you never would have said normally, to people who may not have deserved it, with a force that could knock over an elephant? Have you ever crossed out of healthy anger into rage? Have you ever unleashed the sin of wrath?

What's even more dangerous about rage is that, even when well-intentioned, we are so often wrong in our perceptions. If we could see as God sees, if we had the wide perspective of the centuries and the wisdom of Solomon, we might see that we are confused about who is to blame in a given situation. We are perhaps out-of-line in the volume and intensity of our expression. We may discover that we had an ulterior motive or that we no longer cared about the issue but just wanted to "make someone pay."

Anyone who has lost their temper may learn the terrible regret that comes from realizing that you were wrong. Sometimes, even if I start out having a valid point, my reaction to injustice can become uglier, more sinful, more unjust than the original situation I am angry about.

Aristotle put it well:

"Anybody can become **angry** - that is easy, but to **be angry with** the **right** person and to the **right** degree and at the **right** time and for the **right** purpose and in the **right** way that is not within everybody's power and is not easy.

From a spiritual growth standpoint, it's important to be able to see that what we saw in the riot on January 6 at our nation's Capitol was an example of anger turning lethal. It would be a mistake not to put politics aside when we look at this situation, because from a faith standpoint, anger must fit at least these four tests in order to be healthy:

Pointing in right direction + right reason + right degree + the right duration of time

Let us not waste the opportunity this tragedy offers us to learn about anger. And may the insights we gain from seeing the difference between healthy and sinful anger transform our hurting nation and our whole world, one interaction at a time.




