Fr. Scott's Sharing Spot

Dear Parish Family....

When I was a child, I generally found church boring. Now, please understand when I say this: I loved God. In fact, I had a beautiful relationship with God, often chatting through the day with my Maker as some kids might with an imaginary friend. But church didn't quite seem to fully capture how cool this God was. I saw my grandmother, my great aunt (a nun), my mother and several other family role models loving God the way I did, but they seemed to *actually like* church and acted as though it "scratched their itch" for God. For me, it didn't. It was too long, it felt too mechanical and it didn't seem related to my real relationship with God.

One exception was when the incense came out. I knew then we were in for something *good*. It was only at special occasions - the funeral of someone, a special prayer service, or Holy Week (my favorite), when church suddenly seemed to get really interesting and really relevant.

The idea of incense in prayer is ancient, and the reason it is so loved by believers around the world is because what it symbolizes is so clear. If you were to ask me "What does the incense mean?" or "What does that signify, exactly?" rather than answer you, I'd ask you to watch it being used and then tell me what it meant to you.

The smokiness evokes the mystery of God. The plumes rise the way our prayers ascend. When a priest surrounds the casket of someone with incense at a funeral, it almost feels like we're sending them on a chariot of cloud to our true home. And the cloud is our faith... our prayers... our grief... our never-ending love for them. The aroma awakens our souls to know that we're on holy ground. Because of all of this, to not understand incense is almost like not understanding a hug, or not getting why grandma baked our kid a cake on her birthday. Explaining it in words would just mess it up.

I fostered an orange Tabby cat named Scarlett this summer and just loved her. She's now been adopted by the Bame Family in Earlton and she's getting treated like the queen she considers herself to be. For the seven weeks she lived with me, she'd come over with great curiosity each morning when I'd light incense before sitting down to do my morning prayers. She'd study the smoke and cock her head in wonder. If she could talk, she may have wanted to ask me why I was doing that, but honestly, even her cat brain seemed to get it on some level. She always sat close and liked me to keep a hand on her while I was praying. She felt it. (And those of you who have cats know that she would never have done that unless she absolutely wanted to. Cats are not pleasers.)

I recently spent eight days on retreat at a monastery of cloistered nuns. Incense was a part of their chanted prayers every morning and again every evening. They'd leave the thurible (incense burner on a chain) open in front of the altar as they sang Psalm 141 "Let my prayers rise like incense, O Lord, and my hands like a daily offering."

It got me remembering what incense meant to me as a child. How it drew me into the mystery and made church magical and true.

And then I thought about how many people have told me that they are allergic to incense and that I should not use it because it makes it hard for them to go to church. (At my former parish in Oneonta, some parishioners asked for one of the Masses to be the "non-smoking Mass.") ☺ For that reason, out of respect, we tend to only use it at funerals and some of the very highest holy days.

But, from another perspective, what a pity that is. What about today's kids who could be so engaged by the rising of the smoke? Imagine them going from being distracted and fidgety to riveted and filled with wonder. The Mass is meant to be both a supernatural sacrifice and a community fellowship gathering – all in one. We offer lots of ways to highlight the fellowship and the community nature of our gatherings. Perhaps it would be fair to say that sometimes we may need to bring more emphasis on the supernatural in order to keep the balance.

Because of allergy concerns, we now purchase very high-grade incense from St. Joseph's Abbey in Spencer, MA, a Trappist monastery where the monks make the incense by hand using all natural ingredients. It isn't a powder, it's a concoction of damp sticks that have been soaked in resins. The monks have had it tested and it has been rated hypoallergenic. It smells like what I imagine the Temple in Jerusalem smelled like back in the times of Jesus. And it reminds me of the day of my ordination.

I wanted to let you know that I am thinking about using incense at Mass a little more often for all the reasons I have shared here. I don't want you to think that I'm going to go over the top - it should still be special and distinctive (not like Corelle, more like china). But I think the reasons why incense helps so many people pray, and the fact that we go out of our way to get the good, homemade, hypoallergenic stuff (and the fact that for once in our lifetimes we're all wearing masks all through Mass!) this would be a good time to increase our use of it a little.

I hope that you find things like incense that make you fall more and more in love with our Catholic faith. The challenges of 2020 have helped us to see more than ever just what a gift that faith is.

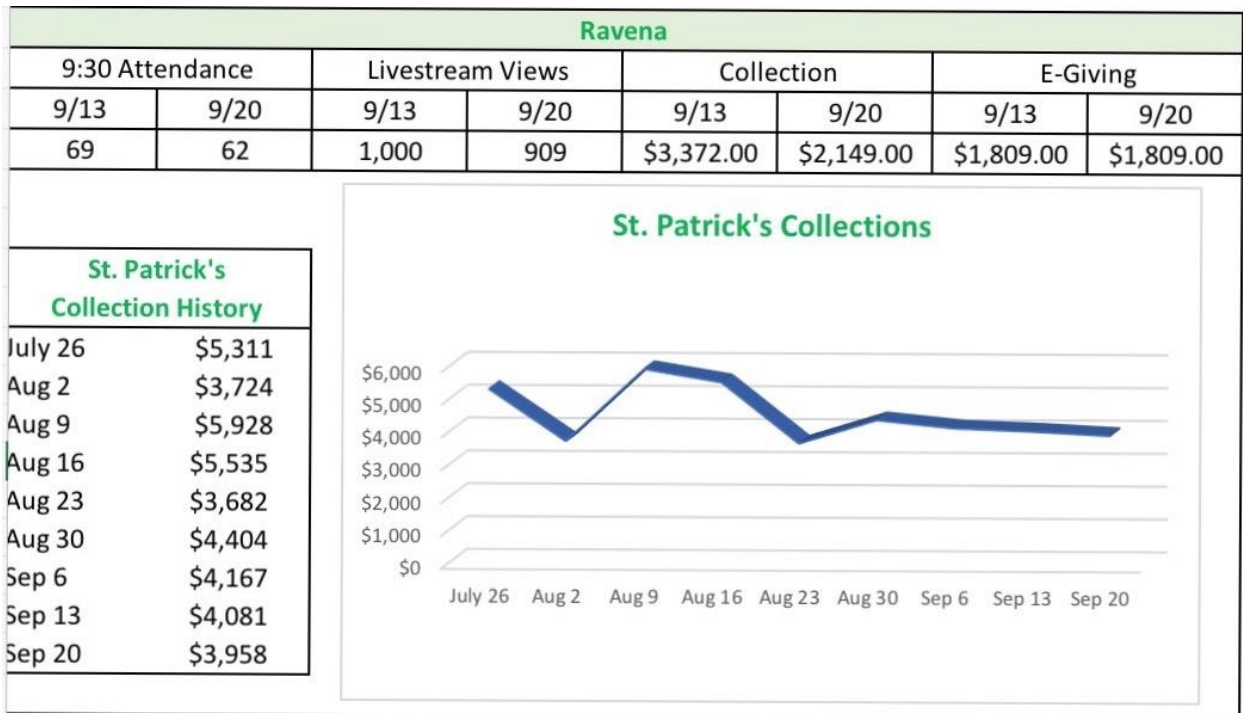
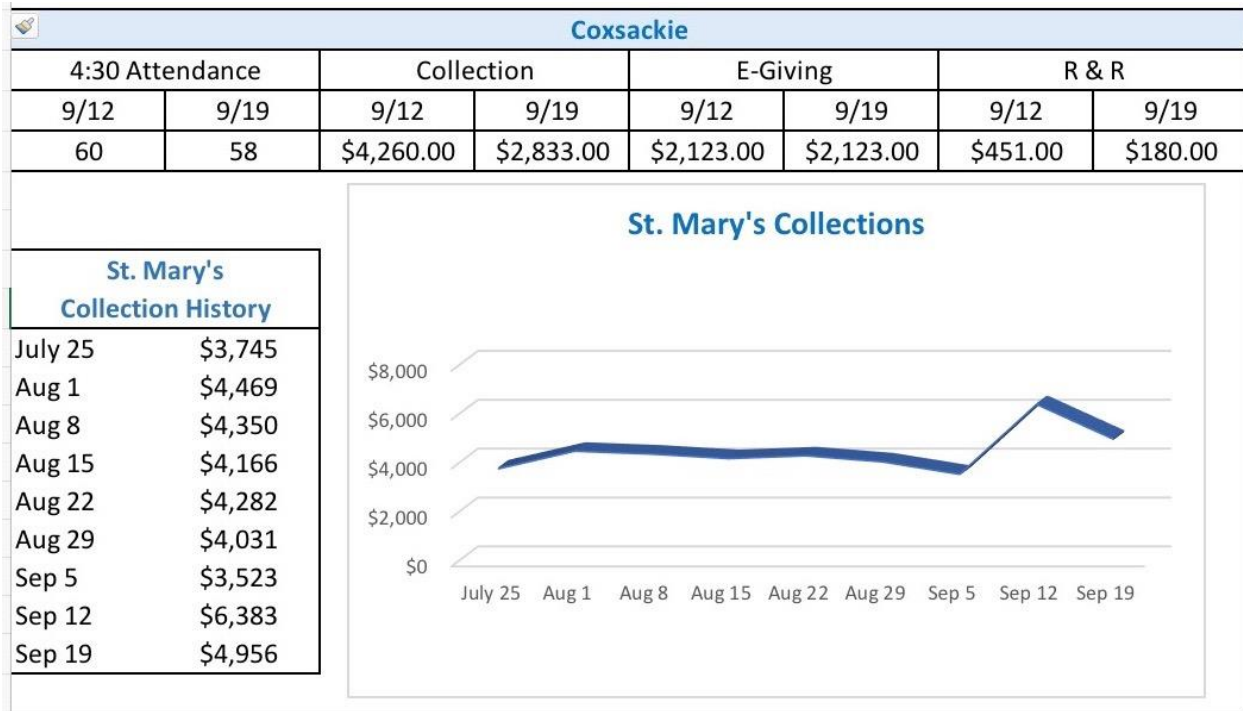
