! When Will We Reopen?


Just as this newsletter was going out on June 6, NYS made a surprise announcement that churches will be able to have services at up to 25% once they are ready. When you read the message below, you'll see that we're not yet able to open, but we are actively and excitedly working toward it!

Dear Parish Family,

This week we had our second Zoom meeting of the Project Team that is putting together the plan to eventually return to celebrating weekend Masses in the safest way possible. Each member of the team is a parishioner with a specific form of expertise that we need in order to get all the details right for making a plan for gatherings that are both prayerful and safe.

Along with me, the team is:

- **Ellen Bradt**, trustee of St. Patrick's Church and an administrator at the NYS Department of Health
- **Dr. Stephen Hassett**, trustee of St. Mary's Church and veteran physician, founder of Albany Med EmUrgent Care, currently overseeing medical care at 12 locations
- **Claudine Potvin-Giordano, RN**, Director of Health Services at Hudson Valley Community College; directs the campus' COVID-19 response
- **Josh Welch**, nursing student at the University at Buffalo and a medical technician at St. Peter's Hospital in Albany
- **Christa Desrosiers**, Faith Formation Coordinator and retired U.S. Army military police officer, specializing in crowd management



You've got to admit... aren't they an impressive group? God has blessed our parishes with so much talent – it's really staggering.

If you saw [the video I posted on YouTube](#) about all the issues we're being asked by the Department of Health and the Diocese to consider, you know our task is a big one. We're do not yet know exactly what the policies will be in their final stage, but among the issues we tackled in our first meeting were the following:

- Recruiting a **Cleaning Team** that thoroughly disinfects the church before/after Mass
- Recruiting a **Sidewalk Team of** volunteers to greet people, ask them to stand 6 ft. apart, distribute masks to anyone without one, explain the entrance process and possibly offer hand sanitizer
 - Goals: providing a warm greeting, information, assurance of masking/sanitization, avoidance of congregating, visually searching for symptoms of illness
- Having all check in at one or two podiums (kind of like TSA at the airport)
- Each **check-in volunteer** would have a printed list of parishioners and highlight the name
 - If visiting/not registered, agent would write down names and contact information
 - The County Health Department has recommended that we use a seating chart so that contact tracing would be easier should someone become ill after Mass, so they could determine who would need to be on quarantine because of possibly being exposed. (This would help us not have to quarantine the whole assembly because of just one person's positive test result.)
- Volunteer would highlight seats on seating chart (like a host or hostess would at Applebee's)
- Volunteer would then write a seating assignment on index card & hand it to parishioner/visitor (like a boarding pass for a plane)
- At door, volunteer **usher or greeter** would ask for boarding pass with seat assignment and seat parishioners
- Pews would be labeled by row with numbered seats
- Each household would be seated in the section for their size group, to maximize space while keeping social distance

These are just the procedures for getting in the doors of the church. Obviously, more planning is needed for us to know what the procedures might look like for singing... the scripture readings... the collection... the Consecration... the distribution of communion... and how people should safely exit the church. We're getting lots of helpful direction from the Diocese, the Department of Health and some great tips from parishes around the country that are a few steps ahead of us in the returning process. So it's a big task, but we are ON IT!

Please pray that we receive the inspiration to create a plan that gathers us for the Eucharist in as safe and prayerful a way as possible. I so look forward to gathering with you all. Never again will we forget what a treasure it is to worship God and receive the Eucharist as a family.

A Word From Bishop Edward B. Scharfenberger, Bishop of Albany

Bishop Ed has written a column addressing the killing of George Floyd, the subsequent violence in our country, and America's "original sin" of racism. The column is posted in its entirety on the website of *The Evangelist* and is in print in the most recent edition as well.

Here are excerpts from the Bishop's column:

“Scratch the surface and we see that racism and its vestiges persist. America’s “original sin,” as it has been called, must be not only acknowledged but vigorously resisted and corrected. Yes, the use of excessive force by some police is intolerable and must be addressed, especially as, racially and ethnically, it is systemically applied differently....

“...In the current crisis, however, the manner of response of public officials cannot be dismissed as an insignificant factor. Was there ever any doubt about what we all saw in that viral video? Then why did it take so long to remove the offending officers and finally place one under arrest? Recall that, before the violence escalated, protestors were simply demanding justice, for the most part, peacefully. Why did it take five days to respond? Why this and similar delays in other cases with apprehension of law officials acting violently against someone offering no resistance?

“...Justice delayed is justice denied. In this, everyone must play a part. If history teaches us anything, it is that the man with his head held to the ground could have been you or your brother. Where the police power of the State is not subject to restraint and the rule of equal treatment under the law, that man, black or white, could be you or me, Christian, Muslim or Jew. In pursuit of justice, all must ante up.”

- St. Mary's Annual Budget for Collections is: \$246,000
- E-givers are currently contributing **48% of our total budget for collections.**


