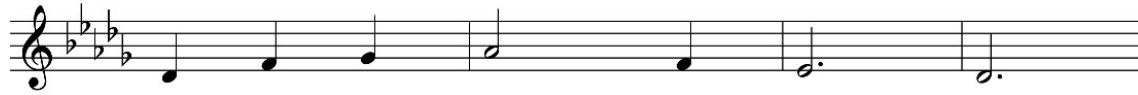

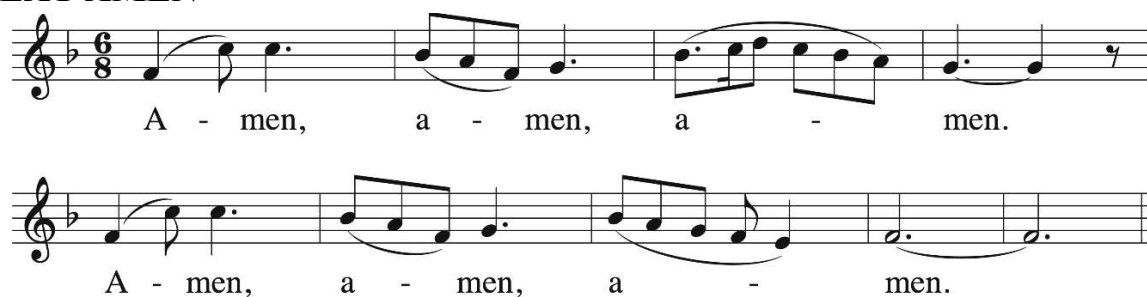

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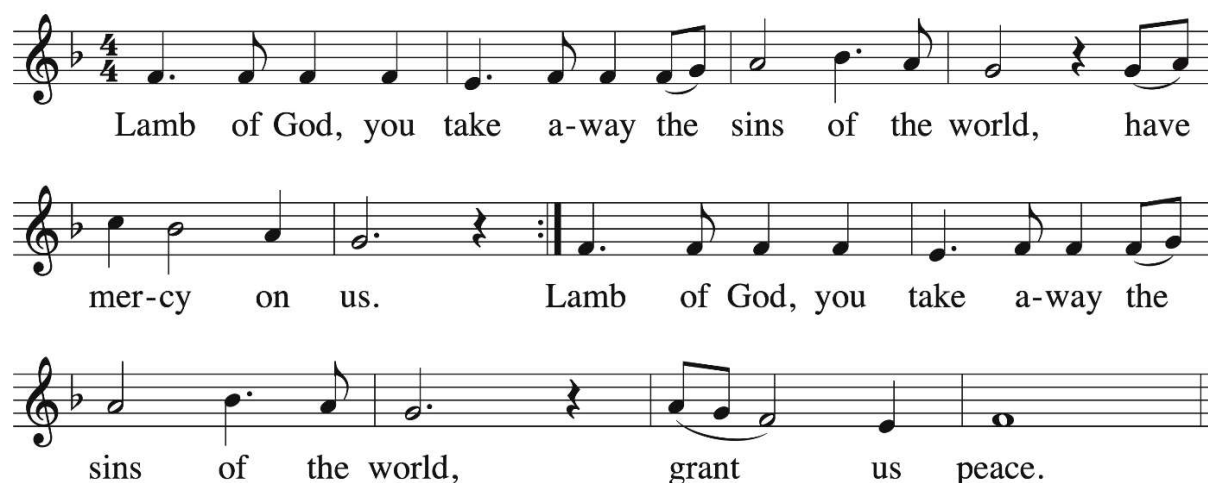

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What's our new bishop like?

In the run-up to Christmas, our new bishop, Most Rev. Mark O'Connell, assembled all the priests of our diocese for an introductory meeting. It was an opportunity for him and us to begin getting to know each other. After beginning with some time for prayer and meditation and small group sharing, he shared with us his own story. He discussed becoming an auxiliary bishop and the work he did in Boston — especially with regard to pastoral planning. From there, he offered some of the takeaways he brings from those years of experience. He then asked us to share, first in small groups and then reporting out to the whole assembly, our worries and hopes for the near future.

Many... MANY... parishioners have been asking me, "What's the new bishop like?" or "What do you think the new bishop will do with pastoral planning/bankruptcy/etc.?" I am glad that now I can start to answer those questions.

My first impression is that he is spiritually grounded while also very practical in his approach to the challenges the Church faces. I believe he does not bring rough-and-ready or cookie-cutter solutions to our problems. Instead, he brings a wealth of relevant knowledge and experience to the table. In particular, I noticed an expertise with synodality. He understood how to work with an assembly of over 100 priests who span at least four generations, from different backgrounds. Some were diocesan like me, some religious like the Siena friars, some native born, some immigrant, active, retired, healthy, infirm, and more! And he led us in a dialogue that was meaningful. This is not an easy thing to do. I have seen our priest gatherings go awry many times, and so his skill will be a wonderful asset going forward. (Believe me, if he can do this with a room full of priests, he can do it with anybody!)

I was also very encouraged by what he shared will be his approach — developed, admittedly, through much trial and error — to pastoral planning. For me, the most welcome shift I see is relief from the timeline of the "Remade for Mission" initiative. Under the former approach, we would have needed final plans by this coming spring. Although we have already accomplished so much in our network, complying with that timeline, within the confines of the process and tools we were being asked to use, would have been to the detriment of our communities individually and to what we have managed to build as a network. So, much work does indeed remain ahead of us. It is probably *years' worth of work*, but it at least seems like we will have the freedom to do so at a reasonable, conscientious pace.

Lastly, Bishop Mark did share he wants to get to see the diocese, visit her communities, and be present to us all through the challenges ahead. So, in time, we can probably expect he will visit each parish individually. For now, though, **please mark your calendars for the evening of Friday, February 13.** There will be a general meet-and-greet for our whole network at the Our Lady of Knock Shrine in East Durham.
